This year, we also launched a new Surgical Technology program for traditional degree-seeking students who want more options to serve the medical community.

Mobile resources in workforce training are evolving, as well. We've added a new mobile computer lab, a 3D printing and scanning lab, and a mobile 4-booth welding lab to add new dimensions to our current array of mobile rescue simulators, public safety simulators, and medical simulators.







At WNCC, the development of new programs is underway. Our industry partners have assisted in developing proposals for a one-year Applied Agriculture certificate program, a two-year Medical Laboratory Technician degree program, and a nontraditional Pharmacy Technician credential. We hope to have all approvals for these programs in place by the end of 2016.

ntering its 10-year anniversary, WNCC's Powerline Construction & Maintenance Technology program is still booming. And it's no surprise, considering the strong local and regional business and municipality support we've received over the years.

Thanks to our donors and advisory board members, the powerline program has done an excellent job of responding to the needs of the community and staying up-to-date, which just goes to show what can happen when all the stars (and players) align.

Powerline students gain the training to apply technical knowledge and learned skills to install, operate, maintain, and repair electric transmission and distribution lines, as well as electric underground cable design and installation. Students can earn a program certificate or a diploma (which requires a few more general education credits) in just over a year, or an Associate of Occupational Studies (AOS) in 15 months. Upon program completion, students possess the necessary skills to work as a powerline worker for utility providers—a career that offers competitive wages and a great deal of flexibility.

The Cougars were ranked No. 1 in the nation for the entire month of October, and claimed their 17th straight Region IX title and trip to the national tournament.

- MLB: Lyall Foran, Francisco Leando, Scott Fogelson, and Philips Orta


Another five players went on to compete in Canada or overseas.

We're proud to take an active role in the many positive curricular changes that are underway, including the Nebraska Initiative—a collaborative effort sponsored by the Nebraska Community College System to develop a common course framework to enhance student transferability within Nebraska community colleges and to our state universities.

Courses will now share common outcomes, while allowing faculty discretion on how to teach them. For example, ENGL-1010, English Composition, will have a common syllabus throughout the state, which includes course description, objectives, student learning outcomes, content outline, and suggested instructional materials. This approach ensures that if and

when students transfer to another Nebraska institution, standardized outcomes have been met.

General Education Also Getting Special Attention

Our general education outcomes have also been updated to align and enhance student transferability. WNCC faculty have been working to align general education outcomes with those at the University of Nebraska. We believe that consistent and ongoing exposure to the following general education outcomes create well-rounded graduates who are prepared for the workforce. New outcomes include:
